

Dear Friends

As the last few months have allowed us a window of some normality, I am delighted to have had the pleasure of meeting so many volunteers and to have been able to attend three in-person events: the Sponsor A Child lunch, the Young Writers' Competition prize giving ceremony, and the Literary Lunch, all a great success, and despite Covid restrictions raising close to £70,000. Congratulations to everyone involved!

A highlight since my term of office began has most definitely been the opportunity to spend time with World WIZO Chairperson, Anita Friedman, during her visit here in October. It was wonderful to be able to tell her of our plans for taking WIZO forward and to hear first-hand how our projects in Israel are faring since events of the last couple of years presented so many additional and traumatic challenges. Anita reassured us that not only has WIZO succeeded in continuing its existing obligations to those in our care, but has responded to the emergency needs for those whom WIZO became their only hope.

I was proud to share with Anita the dedication of our groups and supporters around the country during these testing times and how the unique strength of WIZO women, allowed us to generate funds to meet our commitments.

I am truly astounded as to the diversity of the events organised by WIZO groups around the country, whether via Zoom or in person, when permitted. Everything ranging from car rallies, raffle draws, interesting talks on every subject imaginable, teas, and so much more.

It was this determination and generosity that enabled us to raise funds for our traumatised students during our 2021 Rosh Hashanah appeal. Going from pandemic to conflict, these students had experienced extreme anxiety and uncertainty. These funds are enabling us to provide specialist trauma therapy and to upgrade bomb shelters to provide furnishings, first aid kits and basic creature comforts to make the stays in these shelters less daunting.

Our more recent appeal at Chanukah followed on from the two literary events last year. The first, the Young Writers' Competition, in partnership with the Jewish News and PJ Library, inviting entrants to tell us what courage means to them, and the other, our annual Literary Lunch, when investigative journalist John Ware, a WIZO trustee, was in conversation with political editor and author, Robert Peston.


Funds raised from these events and the Chanukah appeal are going towards WIZO's literacy programme, the Pyjama Library which every month provides over 6000 children at WIZO Day Care Centres with a specially chosen book. Whilst for most of us the ability to read and the joy of books is part of our everyday life, for so many of the children in WIZO's care, books are a luxury and the book they receive from WIZO may well be the only book in the home.

As we enter 2022, we look forward to continuing to write happier new chapters for all those for whom WIZO is their best chance of a fulfilled future. With your help, we can write many more volumes of WIZO success stories, changing lives and building futures for generations to come.

I would like to extend a personal and heartfelt thank you, to each and every one of you, for your unfailing passion in helping those in WIZO's care who so depend on us.

Thank you for your time, enthusiasm and energy, for your amazing fundraising efforts and all you do to ensure our vital work continues, supporting the vulnerable and disadvantaged, and in so doing, strengthening Israel society for all.

Abi Zinkin was the runner-up with her story on bullying which Ivor said was "well written and very relatable for children".

Child's Best Friend

The children of WIZO Ahuzat Yeladim face many challenges in life, greatly exacerbated by the pandemic. The emotional and psychological benefits which children gain from interaction with animals are well known and so the school launched the "Ace Dog Training Programme". School principal Olga Yalizarov said:

"The Ace Dog Training Programme is one of the favourites of our children here at Ahuzat Yeladim. Among the many benefits of participating in this programme, are the opportunities youth have to learn skills for life such as unconditional love, responsibility, compassion and trust."



Taking Responsibility

The Hadera WIZO Israel branch has launched a new initiative "Taking Responsibility", aimed at harnessing the power of community activism in the fight to eliminate domestic violence against all ages. This programme is the brainchild of Aliza Koniak, a social activist and graduate of WIZO's women's leadership programme in collaboration with the Hadera Municipality and a coalition of community organisations. Fifty community volunteers took part in an eight-session training workshop developed by WIZO's Division for the Status of Women. Participants were trained to be community ambassadors, enabling them to enhance a sense of personal safety and resilience in the community in the fight against all forms of violence. A huge success, the programme will be implemented in another elementary school in Hadera in the near future.



WIZO Ranked One of Israel's Best Employers

In a wide-ranging survey by business newspaper "Globes" to determine Israel's best employers, WIZO ranked #3 amongst public institutions and #102 among 1,800 companies and organisations studied. 200,000 employees from wide-ranging industries and sectors were asked numerous questions about their employer and work environment, such as salary, work-life balance, development potential and promotion prospects, social atmosphere, equipment, and employer reputation. The survey, taken last summer, when WIZO was dealing head-on with the Covid-19 pandemic, makes WIZO's outstanding ranking even more impressive.

Breaking The Cycle Of Violence

In December 2021, the Knesset approved a ground-breaking law in the battle against domestic violence. The new law - initiated, written and advanced by WIZO - requires judges to order Israeli men, who have had restraining orders issued against them to receive mandatory behavioural and psychological treatment. This will affect some 10,000 men each year, and will undoubtedly save lives and untold suffering to thousands of women, children and families.

This law further evidences WIZO's crucial role at all levels in combatting such abuse. The organisation already runs the only men's helpline of its kind, to assist violent men in taking responsibility and getting the help they need. Many violent men lack the tools they need to cope with their anger. The unprecedented advice helpline, which receives around 1000 calls every year, staffed by trained volunteers, provides initial support and encouragement and guides the men towards the next best step to deal with their anger management.

The bill, drafted by the head of WIZO's legal aid service, was passed as a temporary order for five years and will come into effect in May 2023. This delay is required in order to recruit the dozens of social workers needed to provide a professional opinion in advance of the treatment and implement suitable treatment programmes.

This radical step was achieved by WIZO in partnership with the head of the Knesset Committee for the Advancement of Women and Gender Equality, MK Aida Touma-Sliman.

In her statement, MK Touma-Sliman echoed the message and holistic strategy that WIZO has promoted and fought for over many years: "This law sends the message that violent men are able to stop their violent behaviour...With this law, Israel is saying that it will not only address the symptom, which is violence, but will also address the cause."

Jewish Women's Week was established in 1947 by Rebecca Sieff and Erna Patak, initially as a ten-year campaign to raise money to help refugees start a new life in Israel. In that first year, an incredible £50,000 was raised. In Erna's own words "through personal contact the Jewish woman can do what the written word can never do".

75 years later, women all over the UK continue to knock on doors (more recently, keeping up with the times, 'virtually') to raise the vital funds needed to create a better future for thousands of disadvantaged and vulnerable people who depend on WIZO. Rebecca and Erna would no doubt be truly astounded that their door-to-door campaign has run for so many years, raising over a phenomenal £11 million!

We would like to thank JWW Chair Joanna Wulwik, the captains and all the volunteers, current and previous, for all their hard work and dedication in going out (in all weathers) and collecting such an extraordinary sum of money.

Here's to the next 75 years of the unique and wonderful work of Jewish Women's Week.


