

CHAIR'S REPORT

WIZO News

WIZOuk is always there for Israel – but never more so than in times of crisis. Since October 7, our Emergency Appeal has supported the vitally essential programme of specialist grief and emotional therapy provided to those in our 800 projects across Israel.

Many of those in our care were already at-risk, suffering trauma which the current conflict has greatly exacerbated. They cover the age spectrum - babies and toddlers in our day care centres; young people in our schools and youth villages and centres; women in our shelters and Holocaust survivors in our parents' home. The programme offers individual and group therapy sessions, with music and animals featured in the work with the younger children.

WIZO has also given an enormous amount of practical support, such as housing displaced and vulnerable communities in our youth villages and providing thousands of packs of food, clothing and essential items.

We have additionally been running assistance hotlines for displaced families and those whose partners and children have been called up for reserve duty. Extra bomb shelters are being installed in our youth villages.

At The School of Dreams, WIZO's vocational secondary school in Beit Hakerem, Jerusalem for those with learning difficulties, the trauma of October 7 and its aftermath has increased anxieties amongst its 100 students, many of whom were already facing significant behavioural and mental health challenges.

In response, the school has rolled out a specialist emotional therapy programme to support both students and staff. Additional social workers and therapists have been recruited to work with pupils at risk of suicide or violent tendencies. The programme is also helping post-hospitalised girls make a gradual return to school life and is providing workshops on dangers such as alcohol and drugs.

Specialist therapy has also been introduced at WIZO Nahalal Youth Village, with particular focus on the students on the Na'aleh programme who have come to Israel without their families. Many arrived from Ukraine to escape a war, only to be confronted with another.

School staff have been providing around-the-clock support with individual and group therapy sessions.

For the very high risk girls at the Adi Centre in Be'er Sheva who have endured severe emotional trauma, seeing media images and reports of sexual abuse on and since October 7 has triggered renewed trauma. Extra social workers have been drafted in to offer support and reassurance and the centre is further offering financial advice to displaced families.

Our UK organisation has sponsored nine state-of-the-art sensory motor rooms in WIZO day care centres, an important contribution given that some of the children at the centres have lost loved ones and many of their parents have been called up for reserve duty.

The most critical time for sensory and motor skill development is in the first two years of a child's life, enabling them to perform the various everyday tasks as they grow. The UK-sponsored rooms are designed to advance motor skills and promote physical, emotional, cognitive and social development. Featuring a variety of padded materials and soft toys such as mini-trampolines, foam inclines, crawl tunnels and ball pits, they offer a safe and supportive environment for children to explore, play and strengthen their sensory processing skills.

WIZOuk is there for Israel - and that will always be the case.



In her emotional address, Lara Pines told guests that her family had left Argentina because of safety concerns. But since October 7, she had been filling her school backpack with clothes instead of educational supplies "just in case you have to run to a bunker".

Although she had felt scared at times, she credited her school in WIZO's Hadassim Youth Village near Netanya for encouraging her musical talents while helping her and her friends "to live a childhood that is as normal as possible". She sees her music as a form of therapy in difficult moments.

Welcoming guests, WIZOuk chair Annabel Stelzer updated them on WIZO's efforts in Israel to deal with the diverse issues experienced by citizens since October 7, from trauma to a huge spike in domestic violence. She reported that the charity had stepped up activities, opening day care centres for the children of medical professionals, freeing their parents for their emergency duties. "WIZO has extended its web of caring in response to the tragic events of October 7 to address the deep collective trauma Israel is facing with a view to building resilience." And in a heartfelt message of support, Israeli President Isaac Herzog reflected on the importance of WIZO within his family.

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Looking Forward

The launch of the **WIZO Women's Business Leaders Network** at the AllBright Club in November was a hugely successful affair.

The 70 guests at the Mayfair venue heard Deborah Joseph - Glamour UK Editor in Chief and Glamour's European Editorial Director - discuss achieving success as a woman in business with entrepreneur and AllBright co-founder Debbie Wosskow OBE.

Among the attendees was Maria Oldin of UBS Switzerland, who travelled to London especially to attend the event and spoke of the bank's commitment to WIZO. WIZOuk chair Annabel Stelzer gave an update on WIZO's response to the crisis in Israel.

WIZO Women's Business Leaders Network

Women Leading the Way (WLTW) is a WIZO network collective aiming to bring WIZO engagement to a new generation in Leeds.

Rather than adopting the traditional group format, WLTW is using small, intimate workshops to grow a Facebook network. The workshops focus on personal growth, sharing ideas and collaborating on issues that resonate with women today.

The aim is to make WIZO more relatable in the current market by focusing on its history of championing women's rights and advancing gender equality.

WLTW's second strand is to strengthen bonds and make a difference in the local community by arranging standalone volunteering projects. This shows WIZO giving back to the community and provides a platform for positive local publicity.

Since launching last September, it has held three networking workshops in interesting locations, led by professional facilitators. They covered planning your next life chapter, communication in relationships and books.

A fourth workshop, led by a successful businesswoman, will focus on overcoming challenges and stepping out of your comfort zone.

The first volunteering project was at Leeds Jewish Welfare Board's learning disability houses where small groups of volunteers showed staff and residents how to make delicious Shabbat dinner dishes.

Without engagement, and new generations of supporters, there will be little hope for WIZO fundraising in Leeds in the future, which makes the success of WLTW vital.

The overarching goal is to create a sustainable environment for fundraising. So while fundraising will initially be small, the hope is that it will grow over time.

Days after the Hamas atrocities, Micaela Ziv granddaughter of WIZO's Leeds-born founder, Rebecca Sieff - visited Leeds and Manchester with Ronit Ribak-Madari WIZOuk President, to inspire members with her family's history. It is the story of pioneering women who travelled alone to British Mandate Palestine in 1919 to witness at first hand the living conditions of families.

They saw that women needed to be empowered to support themselves by acquiring skills - for example, in agriculture - and the necessity to establish homes for orphaned babies. As well as founding WIZO Federations around the world, Rebecca Sieff courageously travelled to Berlin before World War II to rescue Jewish children from the Nazi threat. Her legacy of empowering women and striving for social justice lives on today in modern WIZO, which continues to fight for policy and legislative change in Israel.

New group Bromley and South East London launched at the end of October at the Beckenham Madari, provided an overview of WIZO's goals and a scaled-down lunch was served, allowing us and the importance of membership to the 27 guests. Attendees also viewed the trailer for the WIZO Interactive Exhibition, discussed WIZO's Emergency Appeal and heard how World WIZO is managing our vital projects in Israel.

In October, Oxford WIZO was proud to host the European Council of WIZO Federations 2023 - an "excellent, highly professional and truly captivating event". Meanwhile, PWL supporters experienced an expert flavour of the capital from official London tour guide Ben Jacobs. Oxford WIZO's AGM was addressed by Nicole Gordon of Jnetics, the charity working to prevent and diagnose genetic disorders among UK Jews.

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Jewish Women's Week

Jewish Women's Week has raised a staggering £11,500,000 since 1947 in support of our 800 projects in Israel and this year is supporting emotional and psychological therapy for the displaced and vulnerable in our care who have been so traumatised over the past 7 months.

JWW was started by Erna Patak, a Czech refugee who arrived in the UK after four years in a concentration camp. On learning of the plight of the families who had managed to reach Palestine, she reached out to women across the UK, asking them to knock on doors requesting donations.

She hoped the campaign would last 10 years but here we are 77 years later.

In 1997 – the golden anniversary of JWW - it raised £321,000. By the time of JWW's diamond anniversary in 2007 there were 80 campaign captains and more than 1,000 collectors as far afield as Glasgow, Belfast, Dublin, Cardiff and Jersey.

However, times are changing and knocking on doors is archaic. Although there are now fewer than 20 captains and 300 collectors, they are resilient. Most do not knock on doors, either popping a letter through a letterbox or, better still, sending it by email, or even WhatsApp, and following it up with a phone call. That's how I do it. Letters are sent to potential donors in areas with no captain although we are trying to reach those people via email instead. The campaign is also promoted on social media sites and in the press.

With so many worthwhile charities in the UK, things are now tougher. But the 2023 campaign still raised around £139,000 before Gift Aid and nearly £100,000 of this was raised by the captains and their small army of ladies, proving that personal contact remains important.

The captains and collectors are a dedicated band, willing to go the extra mile to raise funds for Israel, and I am sincerely grateful to every single one of them.


Back in Sderot
