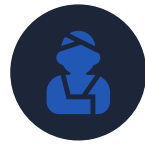

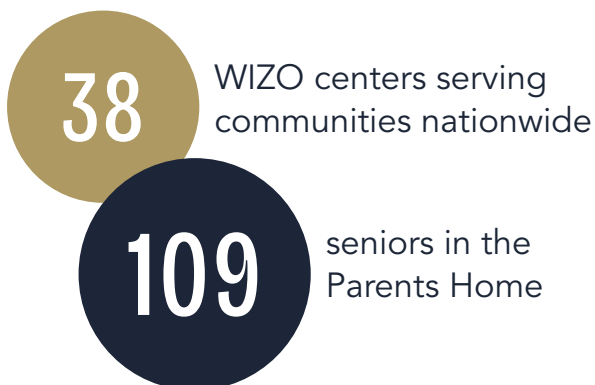

Carrying the Weight, Finding the Strength: Women of the Home Front

In a year of ongoing war and upheaval, WIZO stood beside the women carrying **impossible burdens**: wives of reservists suddenly forced to raise children alone, displaced women struggling to rebuild in unfamiliar places or returning, traumatized, to war-damaged homes, mothers of soldiers and mothers navigating the challenges of birth and parenting under fire.

Through new programs tailored to urgent wartime needs, alongside its core programs adapted to these times, WIZO provided both emotional first aid and practical assistance – ensuring that no woman had to face this crisis alone.

Beyond individual support, WIZO fostered strong **communities** where women could connect, share experiences, and draw strength from one another. **These networks** of solidarity not only offered immediate relief but also laid the foundation for long-term resilience and **collective empowerment**.

Home Front Hero Spotlight

Strength in Extreme Adversity

When Sapir Honyo was forced from her home in Kibbutz Sufa near the Gaza border by the events of October 7, and her husband was called up to the reserves, her life turned upside down:

"I was left to hold everything together: four kids, our temporary home in Ramat Gan, even his business. I felt invisible. The emotional toll it took from me and the children was enormous. But then WIZO stepped in and gave me a space where I could breathe, share, and be seen. Through workshops and a community of women who truly understood, I realized I'm not alone. I found strength I didn't know I had."

Mothers Holding the Home Front: Finding Release Through WIZO Workshops

Partners of reservists shouldering the burdens alone urgently needed stress relief and resilience support. Through WIZO's *Home Front Heroes* programs, they gained tools to process their emotions, release stress, and restore balance.

"The WIZO project is such a blessing—it made me feel truly seen as a woman serving in the reserves. Suddenly you have no time to care for yourself. You come home, there's laundry waiting, and then you're back out again for another round of reserve duty. WIZO came up with an amazing idea: they created a community of women. I realized I wasn't alone—and neither were they."

When War Enters the Home: Breaking Cycles of Violence

While the nation focused on the frontlines, a quieter war was unfolding behind closed doors. Women, many already carrying the weight of evacuation, caregiving, and emotional labor, now faced an intersection of traumas - a **wartime surge in domestic violence, legal vulnerability and institutional silence**. When state systems struggled to keep pace, WIZO stepped in.

WIZO's influence extended to the legislative level. The WIZO-initiated **Electronic Monitoring Law** for domestic violence offenders with restraining orders was passed, and two new urgent legal reforms were drafted: a change in criteria for legal aid, and the expansion of the role of Sexual Harassment Officers – closing critical gaps that leave women vulnerable.

Breaking the Cycle of Violence

When Ayelet Lise married, she believed she had found the man of her dreams. But soon after, the relationship turned into a cycle of physical, mental, and economic abuse.

"Until you leave, you don't really understand that you are a victim of abuse. It takes something dramatic to shock you out of denial. For me, it was realizing that I didn't want my children to grow up seeing the violence. I had grown up feeling threatened, and I said - enough."

Ayelet left with three children and her possessions in rubbish bags. After a year in a domestic violence shelter, she joined WIZO's Safety Net program, which supports women and children at the critical bridge of leaving a shelter and rebuilding their lives. Demand is high, and WIZO is continuously expanding the program to ensure that every woman has a community to turn to when she is ready to start over.

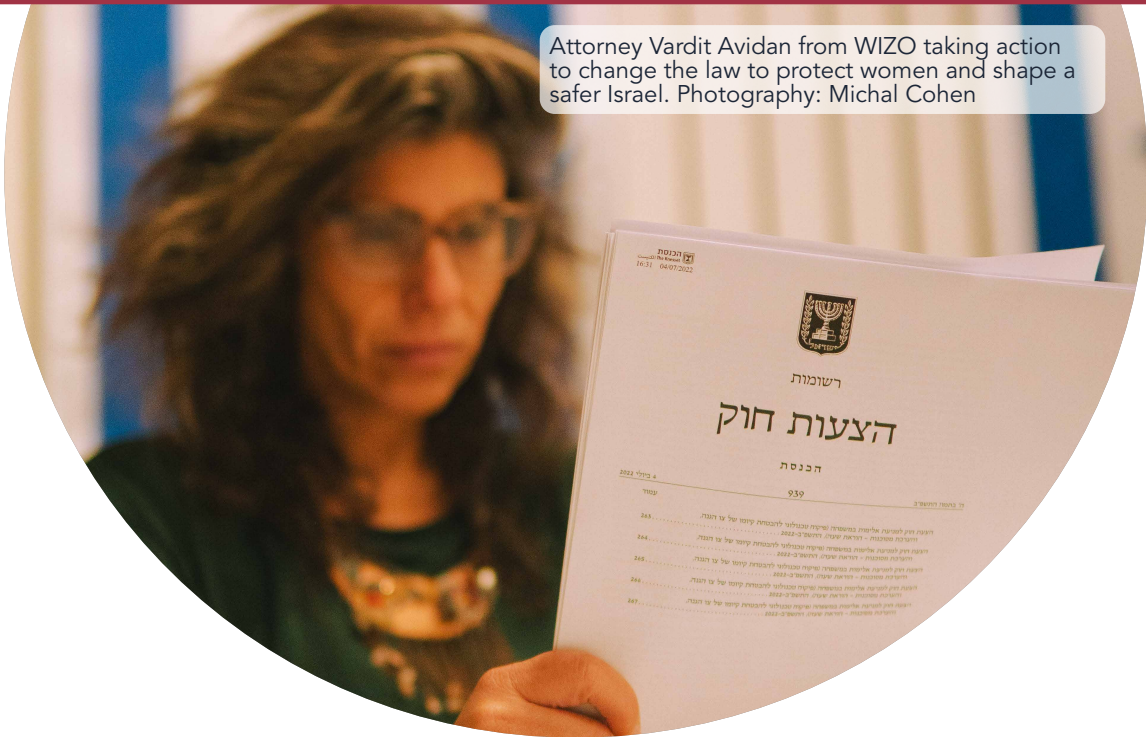
"The Safety Net Community at WIZO Herzliya gave me amazing support. The volunteers were like grandmothers to my children. I had a personal and employment mentor who helped me organize my day and move forward. We had a therapist who helped rebuild my confidence as a mother and my children's confidence in me. They even gave us self-defense classes so we could feel safe again. Without WIZO, I don't know what I would have done – and one day, I want to be a volunteer myself."

Home Front Hero Spotlight

The Courage to Challenge Harmful Norms

Participants in WIZO's *Mine and Only Mine* workshops - designed to help teens identify early signs of abuse and model healthy dating relationships, spoke about how the program raised their awareness of jealous and controlling behavior:

"WIZO's Mine and Only Mine workshop really changed how I think about dating. It wasn't just about avoiding violence – it was about building respect, trust, and equality from the start. I left knowing the kind of partner I want to be, and how important it is to treat the other person's feelings as seriously as my own."

Home Front Caregivers: Nurturing Resilience from the Very Beginning

While sirens wailed, routines shattered, and parents were called to serve, work in essential services, or hold the home front alone, 3,100 caregivers in WIZO's 161 daycare centers became foundations of stability, nurturing Israel's youngest citizens with calm, care, and love - even under fire.

Home Front Hero Spotlight

Holding the Line for Israel's Youngest Citizens and their Parents

Shir Levi, Director of WIZO's daycare in Nahariya, led her team in extraordinary circumstances. With sirens sounding and the threat of rockets overhead, the children and staff spent almost all their days inside a secure bomb shelter, transforming the space into an anchor of care, learning, and calm.

"For more than a year, the children and staff spent almost all their time in the shelter in a confined space, unable to go into the yard to run, climb and let off steam. As a result, these very young children are facing developmental delays in motor, language, cognitive, and especially emotional areas, alongside behaviors that point to trauma."

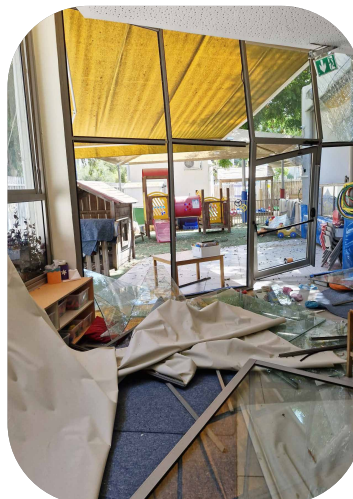
Shir's quiet heroism is in showing up every day - keeping the daycare open, keeping the children safe, holding the emotional line for families under unimaginable strain, and supporting her team. Her work embodies what it means to be a Home Front Hero: safeguarding childhood in the midst of war.

When Caregivers Step In, Parents Can Carry On

For parents working long hours in essential wartime roles, knowing their children are cared for, safe and happy, not only enables them to show up where they are needed most – it empowers them to strengthen the resilience of society as a whole:

"From the moment the daycare center opened for essential workers, we jumped at the opportunity. The daycare is located in a secure bomb shelter, with an incredible team of caregivers who provide outstanding care. Our daughter comes home every day happy and full of positive energy."

A Historic First

This year, against the backdrop of war, WIZO together with the Levinsky-Wingate Academic Center took a historic step forward: **launching Israel's first B.Ed. program designed specifically for daycare caregivers**. At a time when educators are called not only to care for children, but also to support entire communities - parents under pressure, displaced families, and staff coping with trauma - the importance of strengthening their professional and academic foundations could not be clearer.

26 WIZO caregivers are now the first women in Israel to embark on this pioneering track, choosing to deepen their knowledge and leadership precisely in a time of crisis. This process of **academization** is far more than an academic milestone: it raises the quality of early childhood care, elevates the professional status of women educators, and ensures that those at the very heart of Israel's resilience system are equipped to lead with strength and vision.

The impact is already visible - more confident staff and stronger professional standards.

In wartime, every safe and joyful childhood moment is the result of an act of quiet heroism.

Youth Finding Safety, Purpose, and Hope on the Home Front

For at-risk youth, already carrying the scars of family instability, mental health challenges, or the disconnection of immigration, the war brought an added layer of trauma - fear, loss, and displacement. In this reality, WIZO's five youth villages, two special education schools, and technological school gave 6,100 young people a lifeline: a safe place to learn, grow, and belong, even when other schools were shut. Programs in academics, sports, and vocational training were adapted to meet both emotional and practical needs, helping teens rebuild confidence, discover purpose, and believe in a future they can shape.

Home Front Hero Spotlight

Young People Finding Passion and Purpose

In 2025, amidst the ongoing war, Israel was struck by devastating wildfires that scorched more than 5,000 acres of land, forced the evacuation of over 7,000 residents, and led the government to declare a national state of emergency. Entire communities faced destruction, and investigations pointed to possible cases of arson, underscoring the vulnerability of Israel's home front during wartime.

WIZO's Firefighting Track at the Nachlat Yehuda Youth Village was on the front lines of this crisis. 52 students trained as volunteer youth firefighters, completing more than 13,000 hours of drills and operational work alongside professionals from the Israel Fire & Rescue Authority. When the fires raged, twelve trained students were immediately dispatched to local stations, supporting field operations and preparing emergency equipment for frontline teams. Maor Edri, one of the student firefighters, shared:

"When I first joined the Fire & Rescue track, I knew almost nothing about the world of rescue. But as I learned more, I discovered a whole world where saving lives and property is sacred, and service to the community and country is highly valued. The program gave us real preparation: professional training, teamwork, drills under pressure, and field visits. I realized this is where I belong. Now that I've been called to the Home Front Command Rescue Unit, I feel I'm fulfilling a true dream."

Home Front Hero Spotlight

Voices of Youth Rising from the Conflict

The *I Am Here* program is a critical wartime initiative which gave educators a framework to engage youth in conversation about the conflict, providing them with a space to speak up, take initiative, and imagine a future where they can lead change in their communities:

"At first, I didn't know how to talk about the war – I was angry, scared, and confused. In the I Am Here sessions, I learned to put my feelings into words and listen to others, even if they see things differently. It made me believe I can be part of changing my community for the better."

The *I Am Here* program gave educators a framework to guide youth through wartime challenges. In 2024-25, 600 teachers and counselors were trained, reaching an estimated 15,000 young people. In partnership with the Ministry of Education, a new nationwide kit will soon bring this language of resilience into every classroom in Israel.

Senior Home Front Heroes: A Haven of Belonging, Safety, and Dignity

WIZO's Parents Home in Tel Aviv ensures that vulnerable older adults, one-third of them Holocaust survivors, many scarred by past wars, and now living through the current conflict, are safe and well-cared-for all year round, despite carrying the weight of these layered traumas.

The home is an integral part of the local community, with locals joining residents for activities such as lighting Shabbat candles and a choir. During the war, neighbors came to shelter in the home standing side by side with the residents, building a sense of community and creating bonds that reduced fear and isolation.

Staying Strong Under Threat

When missiles struck Tel Aviv and shrapnel damaged her bathroom ceiling, 91-year-old Shoshana didn't panic. She knew she was in the safest place she could be - surrounded by a team who treated every resident like family, protecting them with the same devotion they would give their own loved ones.

"The night the Home was hit by falling shrapnel we were all safe in the shelter, but my bathroom ceiling was damaged - the whole ceiling fell! They came and fixed it right away, but I slept in the shelter that night because it felt safer. It gave me a scare to think I might have been in the room if the staff hadn't got us out in time, but I know I can rely on them. Everyone here gives their all, and it comes straight from the heart. My family tells me, "Come and stay with us," and I tell them, "No, thank you - this is my home.""

Staff Who Stood Strong

At the height of the war with Iran, Parents Home Manager Sharon Zigdon and her team faced personal challenges alongside the professional challenge of keeping the residents safe:

"The Home operates 24/7, so even during the war with Iran – under ballistic rocket attacks on Tel Aviv of an intensity we'd never faced before – our staff left their families and showed up to work. With no daycare, they left their children with friends or relatives and when the sirens sounded, led residents to safety, then quickly called their kids to make sure they were safe too."

Home Front Volunteer Heroes: The Heart of WIZO

Throughout the conflict, WIZO's 2,400 volunteers in Israel have been the invisible hands which held the home front together. They managed the 38 WIZO centers nationwide supported reservists' families, kept Bigudit second-hand stores running, and mentored war-impacted children. This volunteer force created a powerful chain of impact: offering meaning, purpose, and a reason to step out of the house for the volunteers, while supporting the resilience of the people they served - who in turn inspired and strengthened others, multiplying the effect across entire communities.

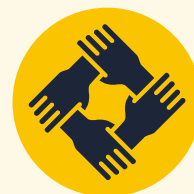

Multiplying the Chain of Impact

Since October 7, WIZO volunteers have carried enormous responsibilities. They gave so much of themselves, many began to feel the weight of stress, anxiety, and exhaustion. To care for those who care for others, WIZO created *Resilience for Volunteers* - a dedicated resilience and empowerment program equipping volunteers with tools to strengthen their own wellbeing and, in turn, continue to support those around them.

For 69-year-old Chava Tzur, who joined WIZO after retiring from a career in education, the workshop came at just the right time:

"I joined because I needed companionship and because my confidence had been shaken in this difficult period. What I found was much more than activities and social interaction. The facilitator gave me the push I needed to continue and believe in the quality of my own work."

Chava carried that strength forward into a project she had long dreamed of - launching a Bat Mitzvah workshop for girls and their mothers at WIZO Bat Yam.

"Seeing mothers who so deeply wanted tools to connect with their daughters, and watching the respectful communication that grew between them, was so moving and empowering – for them, and for me."

One Hour That Changes Lives

Through WIZO's *A Good Hour with a Child* program, volunteers provided children with dedicated weekly one-on-one mentoring that nurtured confidence and resilience. For 76-year-old WIZO Nes Ziona volunteer Dvora Rozenberg, the impact went both ways. Her husband commented:

"She would return home glowing after every meeting. The girls gave her so much energy and joy, and I could see how deeply she cared for them and looked forward to each encounter. They enriched her life as much as she enriched theirs."

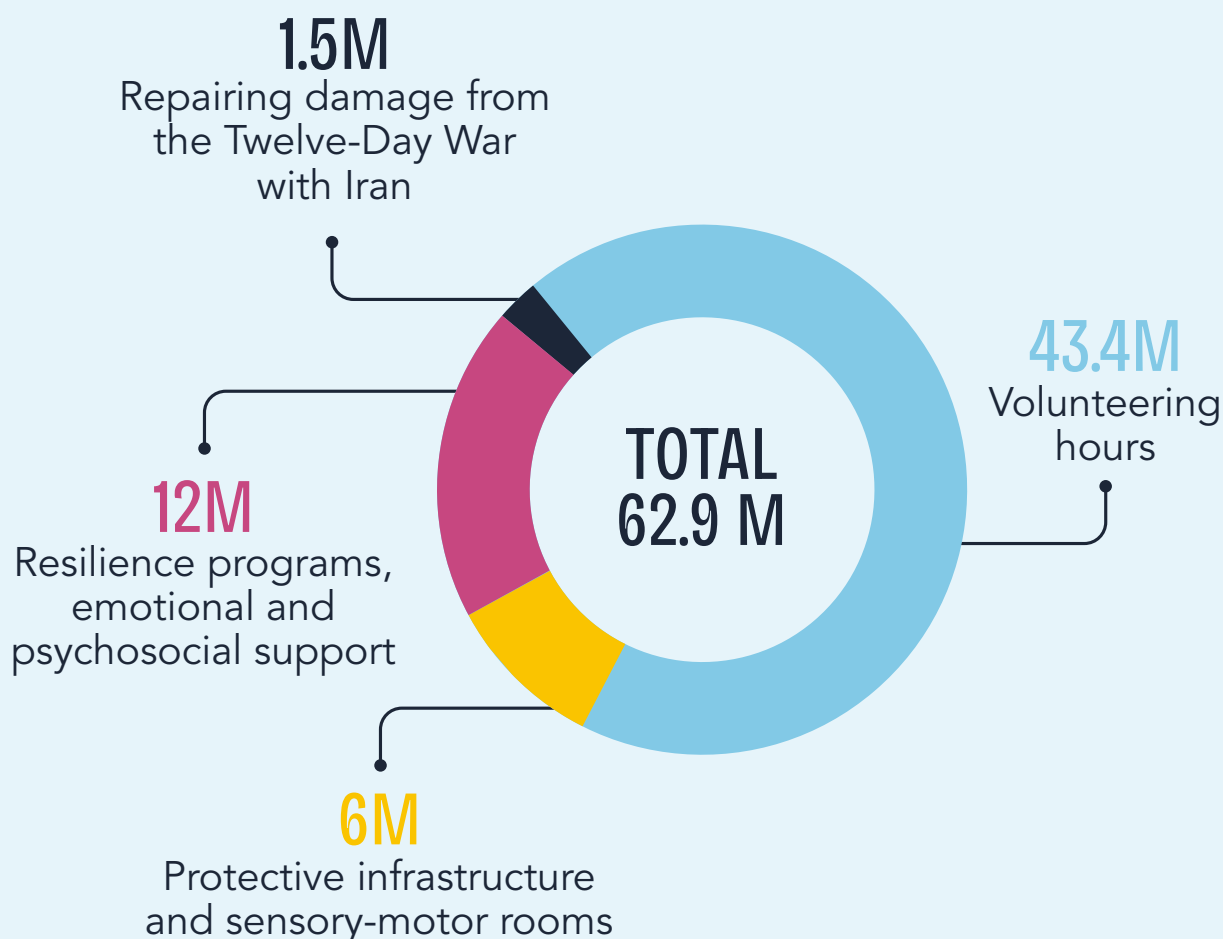
