It is hard to think that we have marked a second Pesach since October 7. Yet, in the face of adversity, we continue to witness powerful stories of resilience, education, empowerment and hope. The war has left young families across Israel under immense strain: they face financial insecurity and the hugely emotional challenges of raising children in an unstable reality.

WIZO Day Care Centres have been a vital lifeline. We continue to support women and children with counselling, access to childcare and practical support and enabling hope of a brighter future through education and self-development.

Women and children are experiencing increasing levels of trauma, disruption of the family structure and social disintegration. Your support has enabled us to bring stability and hope to these women and in turn their young families, who are facing uncertainty and hardship due to the ongoing war.

Emergency Pesach Campaign

As families in Israel continue to face the devastating aftermath of the October 7 attacks and ongoing conflict, WIZO's Emergency Pesach Campaign has brought vital support to women and children in crisis. Thanks to our generous donors, we've been able to provide psychological counselling, food packages, childcare support and shelter for vulnerable families.

Academic Degree for Caregivers

November 2024 marked the launch of our groundbreaking Early Childhood Education Degree programme, in partnership with the Levinsky-Wingate Academic Centre. Our UK organisation has supported many of the women enrolled. Don't miss the wonderful article on page 11 about it.

WIZOUK on the Ground

In January, a WIZOUK delegation travelled to Israel together with WIZO federations from around the world to attend the annual Meeting of Representatives. Delegates discussed campaigns, funding, and the impact of our projects and visited Day Care Centres, schools and other projects. Women's Professional Network

Is there such a thing as dressing for success? Absolutely – according to three Jewish fashion aficionados.

The WIZOUK Women's Professional Network launched in January when over 100 women flocked to Covent Garden to hear valuable insights and tips from Lisa Armstrong, the Telegraph's head of fashion, Jessica Diner, Vogue's global beauty & wellness director and Sarah Jossel, beauty director-at-large and columnist for Sunday Times Style.

which she told guests was a key feature at the Chanel fashion show she had just been at.

"It was everywhere and very clever. Nearly all of the models wore a Chanel red lipstick."

She said it was likely a sign of the times and that the brand recognised that fewer people were able to afford couture pieces than could buy a lipstick at £32 – "an affordable luxury they're probably happy to pay for".

The three took part in an event to raise money for WIZOUK's emergency appeal – 'Healing a Traumatized Nation', to support women and children in Israel who have been impacted by October 7.

Panel chair, Telegraph Magazine deputy editor and JC columnist Naomi Greenaway quizzed the fashion insiders.

According to Armstrong, who had just arrived from Paris fashion week wearing a Dior jacket, "you can't underestimate good tailoring."

She also paid tribute to the "power" of a red lipstick,

Sarah Jossel told guests that her go-to for feeling her best was a good blow dry. She said: "Without the blow dry I had before coming here, I wouldn't feel half the woman I am sitting here."

The women discussed having successful careers in fashion whilst juggling young families. Jessica Diner, who has three young children, confessed to owning multiple concealers, which, she said, were her secret beauty weapon if she only had five minutes to get ready.

Jossel and Armstrong said that it was often hard to strike a balance in the office when you want to wear designer items but face judgement from other colleagues.

Jossel provoked laughter when she recalled a moment she had told former colleagues that her designer loafers were fake. "They weren't fake. I just panicked," she said.

The event was also designed to support Jewish women who post October 7 may have experienced some challenges in the workplace.

WIZOUK chief executive Maureen Fisher said: "We know many in our professional network have experienced antisemitism in the workplace post October 7 or faced hostile environments. We wanted to create a space where Jewish women could network enjoy interesting

and fun activities and support each other." This event was held to raise funds to help those in WIZO shelters for victims of abuse and children in WIZO schools and day centres.

Fisher told guests: "Tonight we are here to gain insights into fashion and for networking, but equally to learn more about the vital work of WIZO at a crucial time of need 'fashioned' by the crisis.

"Since October 7, WIZO has had to respond to the emergency needs created by the devastation of the war, impacting every member of the family and in many cases those who already depended on WIZO to cope with their own challenges."

Looking Forward: WIZO's Vision for the Future

As we move into the second half of 2025, WIZO remains dedicated to empowering women, supporting children, and strengthening communities. With the challenges of the past 18 months still fresh in our minds, we are more committed than ever to our mission of creating lasting, positive change across Israeli society. Here's a look at what's ahead for WIZO in the coming months.

1. Sponsor A Child – A lifeline for Sderot

Each year, our campaigns take on the most urgent issues impacting vulnerable children across the country. In 2025, we have turned our attention to Sderot — one of Israel's most disadvantaged communities, now bearing the brunt of unimaginable trauma following the events of October 7.

Children who were already living in difficult circumstances have been uprooted, many losing loved ones and sheltering in bomb shelters for nights on end.

Healthcare professionals warn the critical window for trauma intervention is six months.

In Sderot, a mere 4% of children received mental health treatment, leaving thousands without support. Faced with these stark realities, Sponsor a Child 2025 aims to fill the gap where urgent support is lacking.

Through our Open House and Day Care Centres in Sderot, we are determined to provide therapy for over 1,500 children, offering everything from professional counselling to caring mentorship. Our programmes provide vital emotional support, strengthening family resilience and promoting healing from trauma. By combining safe physical spaces, specialised counselling and robust community resources, WIZO empowers the children and families of Sderot to envision and pursue a brighter future, even in the face of continued uncertainties.

With your help, these traumatised children can break free from the grip of fear and step forward into hope. Time is running out, and every moment we delay could mean a lifetime of unresolved trauma. We must stand with Sderot's children in their darkest hour. By sponsoring a child now, you can spark the change that brings them back to life, back to laughter, and back to dreams of a brighter tomorrow.

Once again, our groups have excelled over the past 12 months with a packed and varied programme of events. As always, we are inspired by your efforts and hugely grateful for your continued support and vital fundraising.

Tikvah WIZO provided food for thought with a well-supported supper quiz last May.

The following month, Oxford Brookes University social historian and baking enthusiast Dr Alysa Levene delivered a mouth-watering history of cake to members of the local WIZO group. Her enlightening talk included a slice of family life as she revealed that her sister had three wedding cakes, explaining: "Our grandmother, mother and step-mother made their signature cakes. Our mother made a chocolate sponge which we called 'Auntie Queenie's chocolate cake', after the great-aunt who gave her the recipe. It appeared at almost all our birthdays in one guise or another. In our family, as in many others, these familiar cakes are the makers of memories."

In a busy month of activities, June also saw PWL hold a Colour and Light therapy session with Claire Freeman and Newcastle WIZO stage a cabaret tea with entertainment from vintage-style jazz and swing singer Claire Louise.

Southgate WIZO's celebrity lunch starred a woman of letters - Countdown presenter Rachel Riley – and there were two well received activities in Leeds. The Rebecca Sieff group arranged a coffee morning and Women Leading The Way (WLTW) ran a networking

workshop with event organising specialist Juliet Shenderey on the theme of 'Overcoming challenges as a woman in business'. Participants were "inspired to focus on the positive, step out of your comfort zone and seize opportunities".

Supporters of Shemesh Aviv took a particularly keen interest in Wimbledon 2024 after the Aviv group organised a draw, for which entrants were randomly allocated a player in the men's or women's singles events. Cash prizes were served up to the ticket holders of the men's and women's champions and runners-up.

She told her WIZO audience how they tackled the challenge of raising chickens, sheep, cows and goats and growing fruit and vegetables while maintaining an observant life.

End of year activities included coffee mornings at Leeds Aviva and Rebecca Sieff and a Bromley and South East London lunch meeting addressed by John Levy, honorary director of the Academic Study Group on Israel and the Middle East. John is also a senior trustee of the UK branch of the Society for the Protection of Nature in Israel and his topic was 'Nature and nurture in Israel today'.

Kay Wierba spoke to Green Apple members about surviving sarcoma, the rare bone and soft tissue cancer she was diagnosed with in 2018. The management consultant and coach discussed her journey through sarcoma, stressing the importance of early diagnosis. She said her experience had inspired her to work to raise awareness and understanding.

Rotem Aviv launched its 2025 programme with a talk in Hebrew about the ancient connection of Jews with Iraq. Rebecca Barker brought 'Me and My Poetry' to WLTW Leeds. The timeframe covered by her works ran from the Covid period to the October 7 atrocities and attendees were encouraged to "express emotions, capture moments and experiences and release thoughts".

Chamanit organised another of its renowned duplicate bridge lunches and PWL members enjoyed an illuminating talk from playwright and lyricist Estee Stimler. A born and bred New Yorker who has lived in London for three decades, she forged a successful career as a speechwriter, with politicians and top executives among her clientele. Indeed, one of her speeches was enshrined on a plaque given to then US President Bill Clinton in the Oval Office.

And Shemesh Aviv supporters toured the world's oldest smoked salmon producing factory, H Forman & Son.

Our year ended on a tasty note as North Cheshire once again held a successful Yom Ha'atzmaut celebration. Forty people enjoyed a delicious tea at the home of Leila Levine. Guests were moved by stories from Rabbi Elituv, who spoke about his son serving in the IDF.

A Future Fueled by Education

WIZO has launched a new academic programme designed to empower women from low-income backgrounds to pursue a degree in Early Childhood Education. The initiative open to caregivers working in some of WIZO's 161 Day Care Centres, provides them with the tools to change their lives and enhance their role in society.

The mastermind behind this transformative programme is Lea Kacen, WIZO's Head of Early Years Division, who partnered with the prestigious Levinsky-Wingate Academic Centre to launch this degree.

Kacen believes this opportunity will not only elevate the status of early childhood education but also highlight its importance in Israeli society.

Kacen explained. "Research shows that the first five years are crucial to a child's growth and future success. It's vital that we shift this focus and invest in early years education."

Kacen's goal is clear: to empower women through education, enabling them to raise their children with better knowledge and to contribute more effectively to society. The programme has already sparked significant interest, with over 100 applications from staff at WIZO's Day Care Centres.

"We were blown away by the response," Kacen said. "Early childhood education has long been underappreciated, often seen as low-skilled and low-paid work. But this programme is set to change that, offering these women a sense of pride, status, and improved earning potential."

The first cohort of 26 women, from across WIZO's centres, began their academic journey in November. For many of them, this is the first time anyone in their family has pursued higher education, a moment they describe as life-changing.

Yael Malka, 52, a survivor of domestic violence, shared her personal journey. "I come from a poor family, and I've always wanted to be a kindergarten teacher. I was afraid to learn, but with this scholarship, I'm proving to myself—and to those who doubted me—that I am capable. My son, who attends a special education school, now wants to go to college too. I've become a role model for him," she said.

For Olga Margulies, 36, the opportunity to study has been both professionally and personally transformative. "I feel more confident and self-respected. I am proud to go to college, and my children are proud of me too," she said.

In January, Jackie Ellert, a longstanding WIZO member and former trustee, visited the students and witnessed first-hand how the degree course is impacting their lives. Inspired by the initiative, Ellert pledged to sponsor the course for one of the participants.

Students travel long distances to attend the Levinsky-Wingate Academic Centre, balancing their studies with work at WIZO's Day Care Centres.

"I was amazed by the sacrifice these women are making to advance themselves," Ellert said. "One Israeli Muslim woman gets up at 4am to complete her household chores before heading to class. The dedication to self-improvement and family is inspiring."

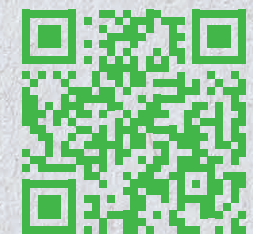

Jewish Women's Week (JWW) stands as one of WIZOUK's proudest and most enduring traditions — a celebration of female-led philanthropy and community action that stretches back over 75 years.

Each spring, hundreds of dedicated volunteers across the UK take to the streets to raise vital funds for WIZO's work. One of those volunteers is **Viv Filer**, who started as a collector for Hampstead Garden Suburb six weeks before her son's Barmitzvah and today, he is 43!

Speaking to the WIZO Reporter magazine, she said: "It was 1995, so I've been doing it a very long time. Things have changed over the years, and we have moved with the times and technology in terms of how we collect money."

According to Viv, one of the things that makes Jewish Women's Week so unique is its grassroots spirit.

"I think it's fair to say different groups are pretty competitive — but in the spirit of wanting to do the best for WIZO. My own group has over 50 collectors, and we raise a substantial amount of money. We're a really big group."



For Viv and other volunteers, JWW is a powerful reminder that every penny collected — whether through doorstep collections, digital donations, or local fundraising events — has a direct and lasting impact.

"I do it every year because I know it makes such a big difference. The work of WIZO speaks for itself."

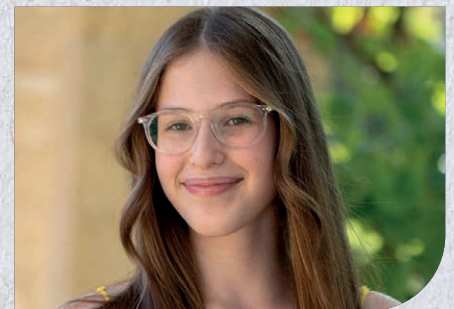
WIZO Story Writing Competition Winners
